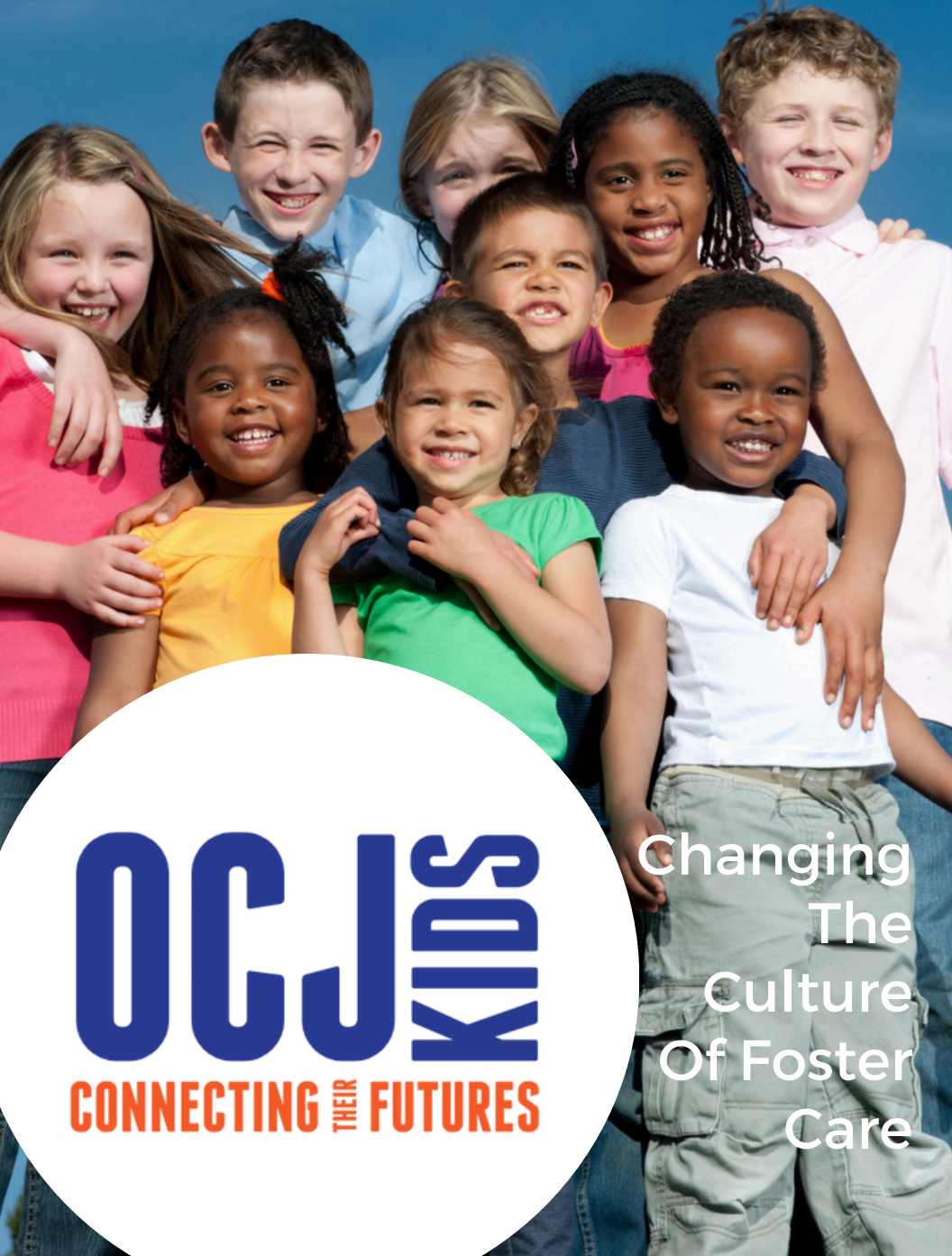

OCJ Kids provides resources to children from the moment they enter foster care until after they have aged out of the system. In many instances, we do not have the opportunity to meet the children we serve because resources are provided through the Department of Child Safety, group homes, kinship families, etc. We record our Points of Impact every time there is a resource provided, a group home visit or participation in a Big Event.

As of fiscal year end, \$505,000 remained in the OCJ Kids accounts to be used for program and project expenses, as well as administrative responsibilities.

THE *Restoring Dignity* ROOM



The Restoring Dignity Room has been designed to create a safe place for foster teen girls to be empowered and regain the control they have lost due to trauma and abuse. In this safe, friendly setting, they learn how to size and fit themselves for bras, and receive resources to better understand who they are and how to care for themselves.



The Restoring Dignity Room opened its doors in March, 2023 and has served more than 75 teen girls to date.





OCJ Kids first met Elizabeth when she was 14 years and in need of a mentor. She worked with her mentor for a year when she was moved to another placement. At 15, we reconnected with Elizabeth during one of our

big events and remained connected with her over the next few years. At 18, Elizabeth received an OCJ Kids Transition Suitcase and we remained connected with her through the Pizza Follow-Up Program. She received assistance and support including another mentor who assisted her with finding her birth certificate, and state ID. She became a part of the Cell Phone Program and we journeyed with Elizabeth through homelessness to her own apartment. She is now working and attending college. We will continue journeying with Elizabeth as she finds her way!

Life as a teen mom in foster care can be a challenge. It comes with all of the new Mom challenges, trauma that led to foster care, and very little support. When OCJ Kids met this young momma, she was learning to walk out this journey despite all of the negative things that she had faced. We provided her with handmade quilts for both Mom and baby, and clothing because these teens often come into care wearing only the clothes on their back.



As our staff became acquainted with this young mom, we listened to her story. Her story needed to be heard and OCJ Kids made sure that the appropriate people listened. Our team has become her voice and justice is being served for this young Mom and her sweet baby girl.



The cycle stops here! The future is bright for them now.
